A Brief History of the Musical

John Michael Telbelak was a graduate student at Carnegie Mellon University in 1970. As a requirement for his master's thesis, he was to direct a play. Being a religious person, Tebelak was interested in producing some of the church dramas from the Middle Ages. Yet they all seemed to be too bleak and heavy. He decided to try a hand at writing his own and in one sitting read the four Gospels. Then, Tebelak, who was raised in the Episcopal Church, attended an Easter service and was dismayed at the lack of celebration or community that was offered. It was then that he decided that he would create a musical that encompassed the joy

And that was how "The Godspell," as it was originally called, was born.

Little known facts:

- Most of the lyrics for the songs in Godspell were taken from the *Episcopal Hymnal 1940.*
- Godspell premiered at the Studio Theater at Carnegie Mellon University in December of 1970. It played for only a few nights, but each showing saw an increase in attendance until the final show played to a standing room only crowd.
- Stephen Schwartz didn't sign on to provide the score until he saw the show in Manhattan's East Village in March 1971.
- In rehearsing Godspell, Tebelak used the Bible instead a set script. He had the actors improvise the stories and as a cast they decided what worked and what didn't. Directors Note: This is largely the format that we followed in producing this version as well.
- "By My Side" was brought into the show in 1971 when cast member Peggy Gordon played it for the cast and Tebelak.
- The conceptual idea of Godspell came from "The Feast of Fools" by Harvard Professor Harvey Cox who described the idea of Christ as a Clown, or one who brings joy to others.
- In 1974, Godspell became the first show to break the color barrier in South Africa. As a requirement for receiving performance rights, Tebelak and Schwartz required an integrated cast.
