**For the younger generation...referenced 1981 events

Soviet ties are tense following the Afghan invasion. Hostages had been taken in Iran. The U.S. boycotts the Moscow Summer Games. The economy is trying to revive after the upheaval of the 1970's only to go deeper into a recession in 1982. Cuban refugees are released by Castro and arrive in Miami. Reagan runs for office and wants to expand military funding introducing the missile defense program "Star Wars". "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down this wall." Walls were topped with barbed wire and guarded with watchtowers, machine gun emplacements and mines. By the 1980's, this system of walls and electrified fences extended 28 miles through Berlin and 75 miles around West Berlin, separating it from the rest of East Germany. The East Germans also erected an extensive barrier along most of the 850-mile border between East and West Germany. (The History Channel)
